Athletics Season 2023

This has been a busy summer of athletics at Malmesbury School this summer. It started with the Area Trials at Bath University in May when 15 of our students were selected to represent the North Wiltshire Area Team at the Wiltshire County Championships in Swindon in June.

At the Championships Harry SC Year 7 (70m hurdles), Charlie B Year 7 (High Jump and 800m), Charlotte B Year 9 (Junior 300m), Sam D in Year 10 (Intermediate 1500m) and Jess H also in Year 10 (Intermediate pole vault) all became County Champions.

In June we took almost 100 athletes and twelve Year 9 leaders to the Area Athletics Championships which was also held at Bath University. Eight local schools took part at the event and Malmesbury finished 4th overall. There were 15 individual champions and the Year 7 boys, and Year 9 girls won their relay events.

The Year 7, 8 and 9 interform events have all been fantastic allowing all students in those year groups the opportunity to represent their tutor groups and take part in athletics.

Special mention this year must go to two athletes who have broken school records. Charlotte Bell, in Year 9, now holds the Year 9 300m record at 41.37 seconds. In Year 7 Charlie B has broken two school records. He has jumped 1.53m in the high jump and run 2.14 minutes in the 800m. The latter of these two records has been held since 1987!

As usual we are extremely grateful to all the Year 9 and 10 Sports Leaders who have helped us with school and Area Athletics events throughout the summer. Without their support it would not be possible to run any of these events and competitions.

Pride Month

June is Pride Month – a month dedicated to celebrating LGBTQ+ communities around the world. At Malmesbury School we recognise and celebrate all of our students and strive to nurture a sense of belonging for all within our walls. To mark Pride Month, Ms Deans and her team created a calendar of events and activities for every school day in June. These activities ranged from bracelet making to T-Shirt design, storytelling and film club, speakers and celebration – and even a special visit from the Athelstan knight. The grand finale culminated in a lunchtime party with lots of lovely activities in the Upper Street – so many students joined in!
