Their entrepreneurial flair and meticulous presentation won them access

to the start-up capital which they will now pay back whilst keeping their considerable profits. Well done girls and many thanks to Mr Stuart Bernau for his continuing support.

UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD INSPIRATION



On Tuesday 26th September Year 12 were invited to a talk from an exstudent who is now a 4th Year Oxford Philosophy and Physics student, Alex Roberts. The first part of the talk focused on what it was like to study a rather unusual combination of subjects to degree level. It was fascinating to hear how there are philosophical debates surrounding physical forces. This gave our students a unique insight in to just how many different subject combinations there are out there. The second part of the talk allowed students to get to grips with what it is like to study at Oxford, what the different colleges are and how to choose between them. Students were also encouraged to think about what is

required for an application to Oxford and the kind of grade profile and skills that are needed. Alex has very kindly offered to conduct some mock interviews closer to the time that replicate his experience which will be a unique opportunity for those involved. Overall, this was an aspirational talk for students who are interested in studying at a very prestigious university. Huge thanks to Alex for getting in touch and coming in, it gave our students lots to think about.

STEM GRADUATE VISITS

This term it has been absolutely wonderful to have a selection of STEM graduates inspiring our students. As well as the visit from Alex reported above, we have also welcomed back alumna Ellie Hendricks, to talk to our A level physicists about studying Architectural Engineering at Loughborough University. It was fascinating to hear about this relatively new course that blends the applications of art and physics. She gave students an insight into choosing the right engineering course for them and tips for writing their personal statements. Thank you very much Ellie!





We also welcomed Gabrielle Rubin, recently graduated from Imperial College London having studied Electronic and Electrical Engineering to talk to our students about Women in STEM, A-level choices, life at university and the wealth of opportunities available to engineering graduates. Students had the opportunity to ask lots of questions and gain useful insight into exciting study and career options.

It is brilliant for our students to hear from outside speakers with recent experience of university life and their career paths afterwards. Thank you!



YEAR 7 AT HIDDEN WOODS

Over 5 days the Year 7 tutor groups grasped the opportunity to participate in Team building activities in the woods! Each tutor group was accompanied by their Tutor, House Leader and the other tutor(s) in their House so that they could begin the bonding process which will no doubt eventually lead to House Cup wins over the course of the next seven years here at Malmesbury.

The venue was Hidden Woods, an awardwinning woodland activity centre, based in 80 acres of ancient woodland a stone's throw from Bath and Frome. During the hour-long coach



trip students spent time chatting with their new, and old friends with singalongs and jokes aplenty. Upon arriving at Hidden Woods we were greeted by Steve, Barney, (number 2 as we already have a Barney in Year 7) and Julie who were incredibly warm and friendly and introduced themselves and the day before traipsing us along a narrow woodland walk towards Beech Camp. No golden sands here; but plenty of beech trees! Once the children had attired themselves in boots and coats, (unfortunately some days were wetter than others!) we gathered around the camp fire to get to know each other. Games were played in order to recall names and the schedule of the day was drawn up.

In smaller groups the first team-building activity began. Could our students work together to beat the other teams, moving to stand on the other side of a tarpaulin without touching the ground? Each group exemplified great teamwork with some interesting, and downright bizarre, solutions to such a tricky puzzle! Not one failed to complete the task. It was then onto shelters where students worked in small teams to create a suitable shelter using a tarpaulin, (definitely the resource of choice!) rope,

With flint, cotton and sticks pupils had to make their own fire by their shelter, which would be used later to toast marshmallows and make s'mores. Unsurprisingly, with such a tantalising feast ahead everybody was able to create their fire and sat happily around them eating marshmallows and s'mores. A rope swing was constructed and students were able to roam, sing by their campfires, eat and be merry!

Hidden Woods was an amazing trip for our Year 7s and it was incredible to see how many new friendships have been nurtured through such a super trip. At the end of the day we sat around the main campfire once more and sang about what we had enjoyed, and what we wished for, now the day was over. The firm favourites being:

ORACY CHALLENGE

Oracy is the ability to articulate ideas, develop understanding and engage with others through spoken language. In school, oracy is a powerful tool for learning. MALMESBURY ULTIMATE FRISBEE COACH HEADS TO POLAND FOR THE EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Malmesbury School's ultimate frisbee team is now entering its fifth year and is going from strength to strength. The team enjoy weekly training sessions and enter national competitions. This year there is a 6th form team for the first time and the PE department has incorporated frisbee into the curriculum for years 7 and 8 to enable even more students to try out this growing sport.

Malmesbury is lucky to have several regular players and coaches amongst its staff and this September, Mr Summerbee competed with Bristol Open at the European Ultimate Frisbee Championships in Wroclaw, Poland. Here he tells us all about it:

I discovered ultimate frisbee at University in 2007 and have played ever since, competing at two World Championships and multiple international tournaments. This year my club team Bristol Open succeeded in qualifying for the European Championships (effectively the Champions League of frisbee).

In Poland we took on teams from Bologna, Copenhagen, Paris, Vienna, London and Munich managing to win 4 out of 6 games and finish 17th in Europe. The standard of play was extremely high and, as a languages teacher, I also loved the opportunity to speak to players from all over Europe and see different tactics, styles of play and team culture.

I hope I can use this experience to inspire our students at Malmesbury to enjoy the sport as much as I do and maybe even go on to compete internationally one day.

As well as being great for health, fitness and teamwork, ultimate frisbee is a very popular University sport with some institutions offering grants or scholarships to school players. It's great to see our 6th form team starting the year so well and so many year 7s giving it a go for the first time.

BOOK REVIEWS

I absolutely love Frances Hardinge books, and I think that this is one of my favourites! 'Fly by night' is set in a Stuart-inspired world (called the Realm) that is still recovering from the civil war that took place there 30 years before. The Realm is still bickering over who should return as monarch, and so various Guilds have taken charge, the most influential being the Locksmiths, Stationers and Watermen.

Mosca Mye, a twelve-year-old orphan, has just escaped from her aunt and uncle, with a goose called Saracen in tow, and unwittingly starts a revolution in the city of Mandelion, along with a cast of a mazing and often hilarious characters. It is clever, funny, exciting and wonderful, and quite possibly one of the best books that I have ever read! The sequel, 'Twilight Robbery', is also incredible.

Skandar and the Unicorn Thief By A.F. Steadman

This book was absolutely stunning! Completely rethinking the fluffy, pink legend of unicorns, in this book, A.F. Steadman makes them bloodthirsty creatures powered by elemental magic.

Skandar Smith has always wanted to ride a unicorn, but his sister Kenna failed the exam to take them to the island to try the Hatchery door and see if there was a unicorn waiting to be hatched by them inside. And Skandar's Hatchery exam is coming up!

But at the race that every unicorn rider wants to compete in, The Chaos Cup, the world's most powerful unicorn in the world, New-Age Frost, the winner of the cup, is stolen by a figure known only as the Weaver.

After getting to the island in the most extraordinary way, Skandar becomes allied to his own unicorn, Scoundrels Luck. And an element that the Weaver possesses, which is completely illegal. The Death Element. Also known as the Spirit Element. Along with newly made friends and enemies, Skandar has to stop the Weaver and her ever growing army of wild unicorns (decaying, immortal unicorns with no riders), before its too late, uncovering many secrets along the way...

I recommend this book for adventurous readers, who are looking for a gap in the everyday life to escape to a whole other world!

There is a sequel out too, Skandar and the Phantom Rider, and with at least 3 more books to be released soon!
