Jack Ranger-Walsh in Year 9 was one of seven young magicians competing as a finalist in The Young Magician of the Year 2024. He had to deliver two performances at the Magic Circle in London, which is the headquarters of the most famous magic society in the world with members including Dynamo, David Copperfield and Richard Jones who won Britain's Got Talent.

Although Jack wasn't successful this year in winning, he got the opportunity to work with Simon Lipton from the West End to allow Jack's delivery, knowledge and experience to increase immensely and gave him an opportunity to work with producers to create the appropriate lighting and sound for his act.

This experience was used a short while after competing, when Jack turned his focus to his first solo show in Malmesbury on Saturday 11th May. 'Moments of Wonder' wasn't just a show, but an extraordinary journey that intertwined the realms of magic, memories and wonder. From using the power of the crowd, where he fully included the whole of the audience with their phones in establishing 'how long is a piece of string'; through to identifying words in a freely chosen book selected by members of the audience and using every day objects including a cup from an audience member which they used for an interval drink, as part of the famous 'Cups and ball' trick. Mr Jouny was lucky enough to be in the audience and said "Jack wowed the crowd with his Moments of Wonder show, leaving the audience asking, "How did he do that?" It was such an impressive feat and one to be very proud of. Watch this space, Jack will be on the Vegas strip one day with his show!" This event helped raise over £500 for the RNLI. The Scouts are due to visit the RNLI Lifeboat station on Summer Camp and present the raised funds. As a sailor, Jack knows only too well how important this charity is.

For the skills element of the award, William developed his Speech and Drama achieving his Bronze Public Speaking Award and at Gold he branched out to complete a 6 month long cooking course.

An important element of the Duke of Edinburgh scheme is volunteering and William has helped out at the Lea Judo Club where he not only helped with setting up the hall for Friday

night sessions, but also helped coach younger members of the club. Even lockdown didn't put a stop to William's commitment to volunteering where he took on the challenge of weekly acts of kindness including making fudge for families who had moved to the village, creating chalk art on pavements to brighten up daily exercise for others and clearing overgrown vegetation. For Gold he also volunteered in the Malmesbury Oxfam Shop, initially starting in "the barn" at the back of the shop sorting donations before being promoted to the shop floor and till operator.

William has enjoyed exploring the footpaths around Malmesbury and further afield with his Silver final assessment taking place in the North Cotswolds and his gold expeditions being undertaken in Snowdonia and the Brecon Beacons. For the residential element of the award he also completed a 5 day voyage on a Challenger Yacht, sailing from Portsmouth to the Channel Islands and back. As a result of his enthusiasm on this trip, he has been invited back to join their volunteer crew as Watch Leader, so many more adventures await!

His Duke of Edinburgh journey has been full of ups and downs along the way. As a history lover he particularly enjoyed exploring Alderney by bike on a trip ashore, and had to show resilience, empathy and determination in supporting a team member through a wobble half way up a mountain in Snowdonia in the rain.

It is no small feat to complete all three levels of the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and William should feel very proud of all that he has achieved. We at Malmesbury School are very proud of him!

On the 29th of April, a group of 22 Year 12 students visited Merton College at Oxford University. Many of us considering an Oxbridge application found it to be a great insight as to what life is really like as a student at Oxford and it gave clarity to the application process, a process which can often seem particularly daunting.


Initially we met Jenny, an alumni student at Merton college, she introduced us to four student ambassadors. We were able to ask questions generally about life as a student at Oxford, including aspects of the city and the benefits of the college. Additionally, we got to speak to the student ambassadors about some of the courses and how best to support our applications for them. This was a great opportunity as it enabled us to get firsthand experiences from the students themselves as to what life at Oxford entails and it made the process of our potential applications to Oxbridge feel more familiar. It was especially nice to hear that one of the student ambassadors was a previous pupil at Malmesbury school, so for some of us it made the chance of studying at Oxford feel all the more possible.



Jenny then gave us a tour of Merton college, being the oldest college in Oxford it boasted the beautiful architecture that Oxford is known for. It is also known for having the oldest library in Oxford, and in fact the first place where books were stored upright rather than in boxes. The college also had large green spaces for study, noting that Wi-Fi is provided across the entire space. Within the gardens of Merton, we also got to see Tolkien's table, some of Tolkien fans may appreciate that this is where a lot of Tolkien's material was written, and some say the table served as an inspiration for the setting of Elrond's conference in the hobbit. We also got to hear about some of the college's unique traditions, for example in the 1970's a group of students decided that in order to protect the space time continuum when the clocks go back, they walk around one of the university's greens backwards, arms linked, in full collegiate dress and- if they so wish- drinking port!

After lunch in the college dining hall, we had the opportunity to gain much more focused support with our personal statements alongside the interview process which will be particularly helpful for both Oxford and Cambridge applications. Jenny talked us through how to formulate our personal statements and gave us helpful advice to ensure that we were well prepared for our potential interviews. Overall, the experience was inspiring, for many of us studying somewhere like the University of Oxford feels alien, so it was a great opportunity to get a feel for later study at a university like Oxford.




GIRL POWER ON THE FOOTBALL PITCH

VIC HOPKINS ALUMNI VISIT

Vic Hopkins is approaching his 80th year and has been reflecting on his life and the key moments that shaped him. His time in Year 7 during 1955 at what was then known as Bremilham Secondary School is a powerful memory, and Vic spoke warmly of his time at our school and met some students from Year 9 and 12. Vic enjoyed being able to see how the school site had changed and relished the opportunity to have a tour and be asked some questions about his life and time at the old Malmesbury School.


Ben Skoulding and John Walsh from Year 12 interviewed Vic about his experiences at school:

Vic's fascination with Malmesbury School unfolded as a delightful revelation, offering a window into a bygone era. His narrative not only traversed time but also effortlessly bridged the gap between generations, showcasing his school escapades with a warm and engaging demeanour.

Vic found himself amidst the turf wars between state and grammar schools, where access to secondary education was a privilege. He explained how exams determined whether or not you'd stay in the school, or progress further into the grammar school. He spoke on the topic of the class photos, which were only taken at the grammar school, and as a student who did not have a chance to be in one, he thought it was "unfair to only show one half of the Malmesbury educational system".

Malmesbury School brought about a transformative shift, absorbing older students like Vic, who was 15 before he had access to secondary education, from neighbouring primary schools such as Sherston. The school, in its nascent stage, bore little resemblance to its current form, yet it stood as a beacon of innovation. The introduction of a purpose-built gymnasium, library, and study areas marked a revolution in education, elements we often take for granted today but were novel discoveries for Vic and his peers. For Vic, these resources symbolised a gateway to endless possibilities, a pivotal moment that he fondly recalls as "opening the window to the world." This new found access not only guided his career trajectory but also played a defining role in shaping his character, leaving an indelible mark despite his brief tenure at Malmesbury School.

A typical school day is where most of the similarities lay between Vic and the school children of today, as kids will always be kids. Amidst the ebb and flow of daily routines, from forging friendships to navigating the intricacies of schoolwork and engaging in spirited sporting





events, the challenges faced by Vic mirror those encountered by modern students. While the tools and resources at our disposal have undergone a metamorphosis, the educational landscape retains a sense of constancy rooted in its fundamental principles. The bedrock of the teaching system, though subtly evolving, harbours a familiar essence that resonates with the experiences of both past and present students. It serves as a testament to the enduring nature of education, a realm where the essence of learning and growth stands the test of time, offering a glimpse into the shared journey of knowledge and discovery across different eras.

It was a pleasure to have spent time with Vic and hear his tales and perspective on life, rural adventures and the power of education.

NATIONAL CRIME AGENCY WARNING ON SEXTORTION

The National Crime Agency have recently reported a recent rise in financially motivated sexual extortion, often known as 'sextortion'. Children and young people world-wide are being targeted.

Sexual extortion or 'sextortion' is a form of blackmail where someone threatens to share a nude or sexual image or video of you unless you give in to their demands. Blackmailers often target people through online dating sites, social media and gaming apps. They pretend to be an attractive person that is sexually interested in you. They trick you into sending nudes or sexual images or videos or record you during a live chat with them. Once they have an intimate image or video of you, they threaten to share it with your family, friends or co-workers unless you give them what they want.

WHAT TO LOOK OUT FOR

- **Something does not add up.** Their online profile doesn't match what you see and hear when you talk or chat with them.
- **It happens too fast.** They express strong emotions for you almost straight away, and quickly tempt you across to a more private channel, suggesting you get nude or sexual in a video call.
- **They make excuses.** They say their webcam is not working and instead they send a nude photo which they claim is of them.
- **They pile on the pressure.** They keep asking you to be sexual and to send nudes with your face in the shot.

WHAT TO DO

- **Tell someone** you trust, such as a friend or family member: They can usually help you think clearly and fix things if you're feeling overwhelmed.
- **Don't pay, do stop contact and block:** You may be tempted to pay, but there is no guarantee that this will stop the threats. As the offender's motive is to get money, once you have shown you can pay, they will likely ask for more and blackmail may continue. If you have paid, don't panic but don't pay anything more.
- **Avoid deleting anything:** Try not to delete anything that could be used as evidence such as messages, images and bank account details.
- **Report** to the police or CEOP: call 101 or 999 if there is an immediate risk of harm. Or you can use the [CEOP Safety Centre](#) to report any online blackmail attempts.

Use [Take It Down](#), a tool from the National Centre for Missing and Exploited Children.

Ticks aren't just a dog thing....As the warmer weather encourages more of us to be out and about enjoying the great outdoors, the UK Health Security Agency are encouraging we are 'tick aware'. This includes knowing where ticks are found, how to reduce the risk of being bitten and how to remove them safely and quickly as some tick bites can result in infections such as Lyme disease. Be tick aware!



Be tick aware

- 1 Use an insect repellent that prevents ticks
- 2 Wear long sleeves and long trousers to prevent direct skin exposure
- 3 Keep to clearly defined paths and avoid brushing against vegetation
- 4 Check for ticks on young children, around their heads and necks
- 5 When you're back indoors, check for any ticks on you, your children and pets
- 6 If you find a tick, remove it as soon as possible with a removal device
