

YEAR 9 ARTISTS

They have explored the powerful slogan art of Bob and Roberta Smith, giving them ideas for typography and bold statements. Students also explored the work of Ai Weiwei, taking inspiration from his Freedom Project in which he suspended a floating dragon installation in Alcatraz to represent the concept of Freedom of Speech. With these references, our artists have developed ideas in small groups and are in the middle of making pieces to be put up around the school.



We have been so impressed with the quality of their drawing pages, particularly their attention to detail on the tiny details of snake scales. PRIMARY ART CPD AT WESTONBIRT COMMUNITY SHELTER





YEAR 11 STUDENTS EXPLORE RAT DISSECTION

On Monday 18th and Tuesday 19th November, a group of enthusiastic Year 11 students had the exciting opportunity to dissect a rat after school. The rats were specially prepared with coloured latex—red for arteries and blue for veins—to make the dissection more informative. The students were joined in the session by a special crochet rat, skillfully made by a former Malmesbury School Science teacher.

Day 1: Students began by carefully cutting through layers of skin and muscle to expose the organs underneath.

Day 2: They explored and dissected various systems, including the digestive system, kidneys, reproductive system, heart, lungs, and even the brain in some cases.

The students were fantastic, showing great care and diligence throughout the process. This hands-on experience allowed them to learn a lot about mammalian anatomy and how different organs and systems are interconnected. Their positivity and enthusiasm made the sessions a real pleasure to be a part of.

PERIOD DRAMA



On Monday 18th November, Year 7 watched 'The Period Drama' by Atomic Rhubarb, a theatre Company who specialises in Theatre in Education. This was delivered as part of their Relationship and Sex Education (RSE) curriculum in Personal Development.






YEAR 13 PHYSICISTS AT LEA & GARDSDON PRIMARY



Cross country Running North Wiltshire Area Championship:



On Wednesday 27th November we took teams of willing runners out to Kingsbury Green Academy in Calne for the North Wilts area cross country running championships. We took 50 students ranging from year 7 - 13 who ran on a very cold and windy day. All were fantastic in their own rights during their races. The championship is broken down into races for different year groups in which we had qualifiers in all races for the County Championships in January. Some special mentions go to our year 10 - 11 boys' team who had all 8 members finish in the top 15 meaning they all qualify for the County Championships. In addition, there were some notable individual achievements. Georgia Grierson and Izzy Coombs finished first and second in the senior girls' race, Sam Davies won the senior boys' race and Matthew Hunton the Inter boys' race. In total 21 athletes have qualified outright to represent North Wiltshire in the County Championships in January.



Year Seven Area Rugby Tournament:

On Wednesday 4th of December sixteen Year Seven boys went to Devizes School for the North Wiltshire Area Rugby Tournament. Year Seven have had a lot of students regularly taking part in rugby training so it was difficult to narrow the squad down to sixteen players. The tournament involved ten schools who were split into two groups of five teams. Malmesbury were in the same group as Hardenhuish, Lavington, Kingdown (Warminster) and Kingsbury Green Academy from Calne. Malmesbury won all four of their group games meaning they played in the final against Corsham School. It was a well contested final and Malmesbury won the match making us Area Champions. Congratulations to all sixteen boys involved who played brilliantly as a team and are a credit to the school.



Triathlon Club - Autumn Term:



In the six Fridays, in the weeks either side of October half - term, 32 students from Years 9 to 13 took part in triathlon training after school at The Activity Zone. This involved training for two of the three disciplines each week. Triathlon consists of swimming followed by cycling and then running. Our previous clubs have led to many students continuing triathlon in their own time and when they leave school. In fact a former student and school triathlete, Lizzie Rayner, took part in the World Championships in New Zealand in December. In the last week of our club sessions

28 triathletes took part in the triathlon competition. This involved swimming 16 lengths of the pool (400m), cycling 10km on a stationary bike and then running 6 laps around the school. Among those who took part some had taken part in the competition before but there were many 'first - timers'. All 28 triathletes finished the race and Matthew Hunton was first among the boys and Georgia Grierson first among the girls.

In October, Sea Cadet Rosa Clough in Year 9 was accepted to participate in a trip aboard TS Royalist with the Sea Cadets. Below she describes what a brilliant opportunity this was for her:

When I got accepted on to TS Royalist, I was so excited I couldn't believe it and when the school said I could go I was so happy. I was to get on Royalist in Weymouth and sail to Cowes in the Isle of Wight and then sail to Poole.

Royalist is 83 GRT and her hull is 23.32 metres long, with an overall length of 29.52 metres. As well as her sails, she is equipped with two diesel engines of 110 kilowatts each. The engines drive twin screw propellers.



Cadets can gain various qualifications when they complete a week on board TS 'Royalist'. Mainly Offshore Hand 1 and Offshore Hand 2. Later qualifications such as Offshore Seaman, and Offshore Watch leader are usually held by Cadets with experience on board the Royalist, but it is generally required, especially for Offshore Watch Leader, that Cadets wishing to gain these qualifications also have experience on board the Yachts TS 'Vigilant' or the sister TS 'City Liveryman'. I achieved my Offshore Hand 1 qualification during this trip.

During the voyage I had to do some up and overs using a harness. I climbed up to the first platform (circled in the picture) and down the other side. In the second picture you can see me connecting the slip lock to allow me to climb. I also got to climb up to the middle and top sail and undo them to let them down. I really enjoyed climbing because you could see everything for miles!

We also had lots of cleaning to do. I was on the brass bell and on the deck. This involved cleaning everything on your hands and knees. We were at it all day!

Night watch was fun and tiring. It was very rough and dark and I was awake 8-10pm and 12-2 am. We also had shore leave and at one point we were docked alongside HMS Queen Elizabeth who saluted us and we saluted back. We practiced safety drills and practiced our seamanship whilst at sea .

When it was home time I was sad to leave but I now have a memory to last a life-time! Goodbye Royalist! Hope to see you soon!

With many students lamenting that they could only choose one, many of these book titles can also now be found in our library vending machine!






READING CHALLENGES

"I enjoy axiom because there are lots of challenges and you get to think collaboratively with friends in a smaller environment."



Year 7 Maths Challenge

TEACHER TALK WITH YEAR 7



7EJH were very keen to contribute to this term's Malmesbury Matters, and decided to carry out an interview with Mr Freer, Geography Teacher at Malmesbury School

What were your favourite subjects when you were at school?

"At school, Geography was my favourite, followed by History. I also really enjoyed French. Miss Sims (my French teacher) was unorthodox but very fun, although I didn't learn much French."

Where did you go to university?

"I spent my undergraduate at Plymouth University. Then I went to Swansea for a year for my Post Graduate."

Why did you choose to become a geography teacher?

"I have always been an instructor, instructing canoeing and scuba diving, so teaching was a natural progression. However, I wanted to teach geography because of my Geography teacher at school, Mr House. He made me understand the landscape that I live in, and he was an environmentalist campaigner. He was what I thought a good teacher should be."

How long have you worked at Malmesbury school?

"I have been here since 2004, so this year is my 20th year! I have now started teaching the kids of previous students!"

What subject would you teach if you weren't teaching your current subject?

"I would love to teach any of them! I used to have to do lots of cover, and I liked teaching anything. It might be history. I would love to teach music, but I can't play anything or sing!"

Do you enjoy being a teacher?

"Yes, that's why I am still here! I love the day-to-day of being in the classroom, and working with young people, and making sure they enjoy themselves. There are bits that aren't as enjoyable but generally I still love it."

Who is your best friend in school?

"I can't pick one person, but anyone in the Humanities department, they are a great bunch of friends. I know I can talk to any of them, and they will help me out and have a laugh."

What are your hobbies?

"I used to play hockey but I had to stop because of an injury. I used to go scuba diving, but I can't do that anymore. I have now just started sailing."

Do you have any pets?

"No, we just don't have time, we are far too busy!"

How many countries have you been to and which is your favourite country in the world?

"25 countries at least! My favourite place used to be Peru, as I lived and worked there. But I recently went to Ecuador and this has become my favourite place, because one day you can be in the rainforest, then the next in the desert and the next at the sea. It also has a lovely culture and the people are really friendly."

What is your favourite food?

"Ceviche - a Peruvian meal. It is raw fish marinated in lime juice and chilli. The acid from the lime juice cooks the fish."

What is your favourite animal?


