

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Apprenticeships

What are degree apprenticeships?

A degree apprenticeship enables you to gain a full undergraduate or master's degree while you work. Degree apprenticeships take three to six years to complete, depending on the course level.

You'll spend most of your time working and you'll also study part-time at university. For example, you might go to university one or two days per week, or in short blocks, such as a week at a time. Overall, you spend about 20% of your time studying vs. 80% of your time working.

Applying for a degree apprenticeship:

You apply for a degree apprenticeship in the same way you apply for a normal job. You'll need to submit an application, which usually includes a CV and cover letter. If you're also applying for university, you could use your personal statement as a starting point for your application.

Employers advertise degree apprenticeships throughout the year and there is no application cycle like there is with university. The vacancy will state when the application deadline is, and when the apprenticeship is due to start.

Art Foundation



What's an Art Foundation Diploma?

An Arts Foundation Diploma is a qualification that helps you develop your creative practice and progress to study art and design at degree level. It's a one-year intensive course that will give you specialist knowledge and skill that's not taught at secondary level.

Why take the Art Foundation Diploma course?

An Art foundation course gives you a chance to explore different specialisms like drawing, painting, fashion, textiles, installation art, printmaking, graphic illustration, 3D design and fine art. You'll build up a portfolio of work to show at interview and can make an informed decision on what you might study at a degree level. Many universities prefer you to complete an Art Foundation Diploma before applying for a degree.

Some of the most common courses of study that students pursue after completing a foundation degree in art are:

Architecture, Animation, Fashion, Film, Fine Art, Illustration, Interior Design, Product Design



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Conservatoire

Conservatoires provide performance-based higher education, including music, drama, screen and production courses – both at undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

Courses are based around individual tuition, practical training, and frequent opportunities to perform. For example, although all conservatoires offer music courses, only two offer drama courses, and some offer subjects like film and production. The conservatoires in the UCAS Conservatoires scheme are:

Other conservatoires may operate outside the UCAS Conservatoire scheme. and you may have to apply to them direct or through the UCAS Undergraduate scheme. If the conservatoire is not listed above, check with them to find out more about their admissions process.



Gap Years

A gap year offers you the opportunity to gain skills and experiences, save and earn money, while giving you time to reflect and focus on what you want to do next.

A productive gap year can be valuable on your CV — many employers value the experiences students have gained if they've actively managed their time, set themselves goals, and stretched themselves.

A gap year can also enhance your higher education studies — if you decide to apply for Uni, you could tailor your gap year to relate it to the subject area you plan to study.

Going to Uni? check about deferring or are you going into Law or VetMed- still some stigma around gap years.





Work

Things to think about...

Are suitable jobs available locally? Make sure you research the local job market. (LMI)

How will you find the adjustment to working life? It may take a while to get used to the hours and shorter holidays.

Are you sure about your career plans?

If you want to get straight into work you may want to consider the following.

Internship- An internship or work placement can give you the opportunity to work at a company with the intention of learning new skills and gaining experience in a particular industry. More and more companies are offering these types of positions to school leavers, as well as to graduates.*

Start a business- Becoming an entrepreneur can be exciting, but think carefully about your ideas and make a solid business plan.


Access higher earnings:

For the second year running graduate starting salaries at the UK's leading graduate employers are set to increase in 2023-4, to a new median starting salary of






- 1. Start research early there are a lot of higher education options to choose from!
- 2. Register in the UCAS Hub and browse through courses
- 3. Know the deadlines for some courses, the application deadline is almost a year in advance of when the course starts.
- 4. Go to UCAS events and course provider open days speak to UCAS and higher education staff to get answers to questions.
- 5. Check entry requirements make sure they can get the grades they need to get a place on a course. (SUPER CURRICULA/ WEX)
- 6. Draft and redraft the personal statement get plenty of feedback and refine it
- 7. Understand student finance so they can make the best arrangements to fund their studies.
- 8. Be prepared for results day make sure they're prepared for all the possible outcomes.
- 9. Understand how Extra and Clearing work different ways to apply for more courses.
- 10. Visit UCAS Facebook and Twitter regularly to get advice and ask questions.







Applying to University

What needs to be done by these dates?

You'll need to leave enough time to complete your application, resolve any queries and make sure it reaches us by the deadline.

After you find courses and you're ready to apply, we'll explain everything in more detail, but here's a brief overview:

Fill in your details, qualifications and course choices.


Write a personal statement to demonstrate you'll be a good student.


Include your reference and pay your application fee.

The new personal statement for 2026 entry

For students applying to start their studies in 2026, personal statements are changing from one longer piece of text to three separate sections, each with a different question to help shape the focus for students' answers. Each section will have a minimum character count of 350 characters, which is clearly labelled on the question boxes, along with an overall character counter, to ensure students know if they're on track. The new web page for submitting the personal statement will also feature helpful onpage guidance for each question.

The new questions are as follows:

- 1. Why do you want to study this course or subject?
- 2. How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject?
- 3. What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?

The personal statement will still be 4000 characters in total; this includes spaces.

The content of the personal statement will remain broadly the same - it will just be split across three sections rather than one longer piece of text.



Motivations for studying this course(s):

- Have you been inspired by a key role model or moment in your life?
- Is it a subject you love and want to pursue further?
- What is your drive?
- How has your path led you to this course or subject area?

Knowledge of this subject area and interests:

- Is there a particular subject area you've researched?
- Something you can't wait to learn more about?
- What about a book or subject expert doing great things that's sparked your interest?

Future plans; demonstrate why this course/subject is a good fit:

- Do you already have a particular profession in mind?
- How might you use your studies to launch your career?
- What's important to you and your future, and how might the knowledge gained from this course(s) help you achieve this?

Remember these are just some examples, you don't need to include it all.

The key is to research the course(s) to find out what might be most relevant.



How your studies or training relate to chosen course(s) or subject area:

- This could be your current or previous studies.
- This could be from any form of formal education

 think school, college, training, or short online courses.


What relevant or transferable skills have you got that make you a great candidate:

- Are there a couple of subjects that helped you develop a core set of relevant skills required for your chosen course(s).
- Maybe a particular module or project helped you understand where your interests and strengths lie.

Any relevant educational achievements

- Universities and colleges will see your grades on your application don't waste space talking about these.
- Focus on your other accomplishments like a competition, holding a position of responsibility or representing the school/college.

Remember these are just some examples, you don't need to include it all. The key is to research the course(s) to find out what might be most relevant.



Work experience, employment, or volunteering

- In-person or virtual work experience.
- Paid for work or volunteering.
- The key thing is reflection on the experiences and the skills gained relevant to your chosen course(s).

Personal life experiences or responsibilities

- Is there a situation you've personally overcome that has influenced your decision?
- Are there personal experiences that have helped you develop essential qualities for the course?

Hobbies and any extracurricular or outreach activities:

- Think sports, reading, community work, summer schools.
- Any activities outside of core studies that help further showcase why you'd make a great student.

Achievements outside of school or college

 This could be a position of responsibility for local clubs or groups, competitions, or qualifications you've attained outside of the classroom.

Maintenance Loan for living costs

You have to give details of your <u>household income</u> and your course start date.

The loan is paid directly into your bank account at the start of each term. You have to pay the loan back.

How much you repay

How much you repay depends on your income. You'll repay a percentage of your income over the 'threshold' for your type of loan, depending on how often you get paid.

The thresholds are different for each plan type.

Plan type	Yearly threshold	Monthly threshold	Weekly threshold
Plan 1	£22,015	£1,834	£423
Plan 2	£27,295	£2,274	£524
Plan 4	£27,660	£2,305	£531
Plan 5	£25,000	£2,083	£480
Postgraduate Loan	£21,000	£1,750	£403
You'll repay either:			

9% of your income over the threshold if you're on Plan 1, 2, 4 or 5 6% of your income over the threshold if you're on a Postgraduate Loan plan



Example

You're on Plan 1 and have an income of £33,000 a year, meaning you get paid £2,750 each month.

Calculation:

£2,750 - £1,834 (your income minus the Plan 1 threshold) = £916

9% of £916 = £82

This means the amount you'd repay each month would be £82.

Example

You're on Plan 4 and have an income of £30,000 a year, meaning you get paid £2,500 each month.

Calculation:

£2,500 – £2,305 (your income minus the Plan 4 threshold) = £195

9% of £195 = £18

This means the amount you'd repay each month would be £18.

Interest

How much interest you're charged depends which plan type you're on. You're currently charged:

5.25% if you're on Plan 1

6.9% if you're on Plan 2

5.25% if you're on Plan 4

6.9% if you're on a Postgraduate Loan plan

The interest rate for Plan 5 will be based on the Retail Price Index.




